Sharaya Souza

Sharaya Souza (Taos Pueblo, Ute, Kiowa), Executive Director of the American Indian Cultural District, dedicated to recognizing, honoring, and celebrating American Indian legacy, culture, people, and contributions. She is an ambassador for promoting equitable resource distribution to American Indian communities, increasing Native visibility and political representation, and protecting and preserving American Indian cultural resources in the San Francisco Bay Area. She currently serves on the Presidio Activators Council, San Francisco Heritage, Aquatic Park Pier Planning Committee, and the

Human Rights Commission Roundtable. She has previously served on the Environmental Justice Working Group, SFAC Monuments Memorials Advisory Committee, Climate Council, Housing Policy Committee, and the HRC Racial Equity in the Arts Working Group. Her prior work included establishing Native visibility in tech, sacred site and tribal cultural resource preservation, land use mediation, helping tribal groups gain recognition as non-federally recognized tribes, and protecting Native American human remains.



Sara Moncado

Sara Moncada (Yaqui), M.A., is a Native educator, dancer, filmmaker, author and cultural arts advocate. She is CEO of The Cultural Conservancy, a native-led non-profit working in Indigenous land, rights and revitalization projects, is co-founder of Wise Women Circles, a women-owned media company, and is co-director of Sewam American Indian Dance, a Bay Area-based cultural arts and education organization. She presents internationally on traditional Native Foodways, arts and culture and is co-author of the book The Dance of Caring, a book exploring Native American Hoop Dance as a model for

wellness. She is producer of the internationally successful documentary film NURSES If Florence Could See Us Now and the film project Finding Compás; and is producer of The Cultural Conservancy's The Native Seed Pod, a new podcast series that explores and celebrates traditional seeds, Native Foodways and Traditional Ecological Knowledge.



Drew Becher

Drew Becher has served as the Chief Executive Officer of the San Francisco Parks Alliance since 2017. In 2018 alone, Drew led the organization as it completed 20+ park projects, engaged 100,000+ residents in park programming, and helped raise \$20M+ for capital projects. His invaluable work ranges from regional and community-based parks to highly demanding urban redevelopment projects. His experiences have fashioned his dedication to public improvement, sustainable development, and design excellence, as well as commitment to an inclusive team approach, application of a local vernacular, and a detailed execution for each project's overall success. This experience plays an important role at De-Pave Park, coordinating a broad team of engineers, horticulturalists, and designers, bringing the transition of De-Pave Park to a habitat driven response to sea level rise, a model for shoreline adaptation.
